

# B/C's classy coaches

B/C's Summer of '78 coaching staff consisted of 42 of the finest high school basketball coaches in America.

They came from near — like Macon Southwest's Don Richardson. They came from afar — like Ray Haskins of Brooklyn Alexander Hamilton, N.Y. Indeed, they came from 19 different states.

Basketball hothead Illinois led the way with six coaches, followed by host state Georgia with five. Thereafter it was Florida (4), Michigan (4), Alabama (3), Indiana (2), Tennessee (2), South Carolina (2), Kentucky (2), Ohio (2), Pennsylvania (2), Arkansas (1), Louisiana (1), Mississippi (1), North Carolina (1), Virginia (1), New York (1), New Jersey (1) and the District of Columbia (1).

Six B/C coaches have worked all three of our sessions these past two years — Macon's Richardson, Atlantans David Jones and Tevester Anderson, the North/South Carolina duo of Harvey Reid Jr. and Earl Lovelace, plus Tennessee's Dorsey Sims Jr.

B/C's staff represents the elite of their particular states. All the coaches have constructed ultra-successful programs. Virtually all have won state championships. Last season, Richardson piloted Macon Southwest to the state 4A title. In Ohio, Joe Petrocelli of Kettering Alter won the 3A championship. Jim Haley of Ocala Vanguard did the same in Florida 3A. So did Dorsey Sims of Memphis Melrose in Tennessee 3A. And on and on . . .

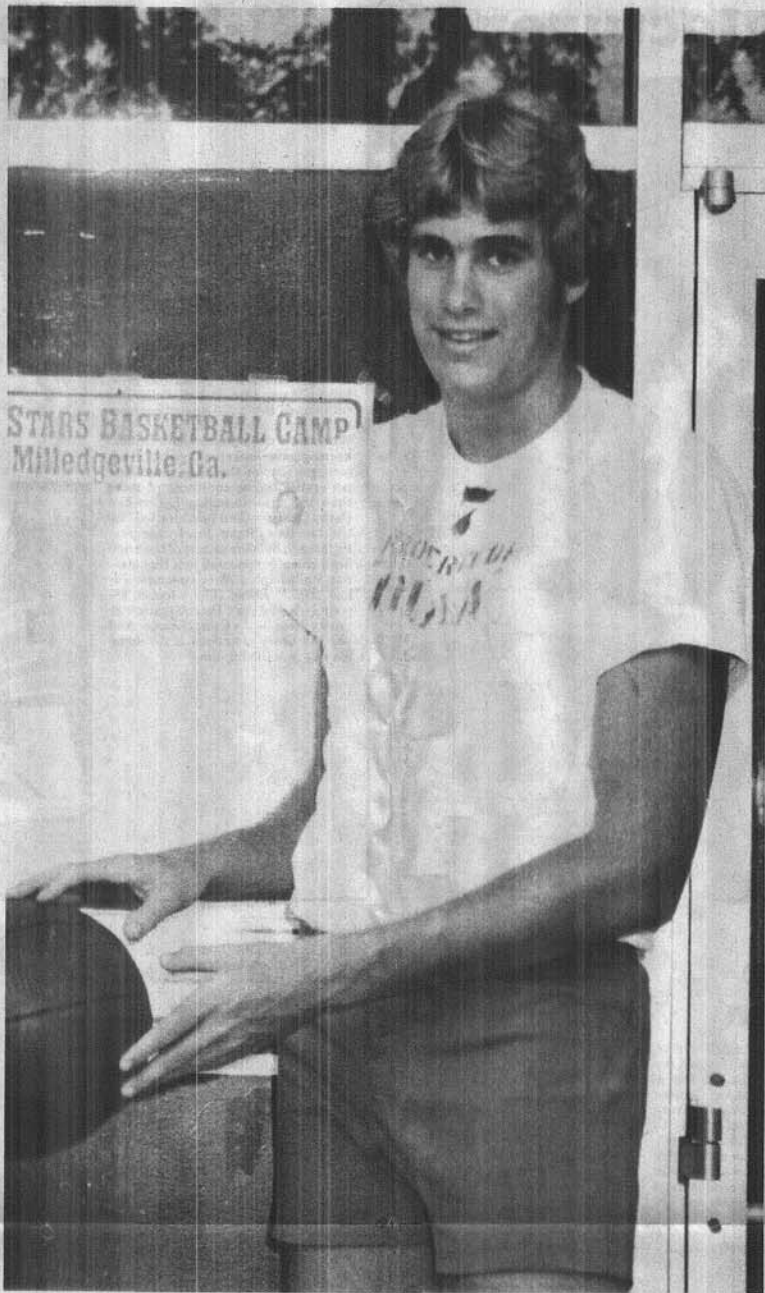
Our coaches provided unparalleled instruction, from the fundamental station drills to the game-time situations. They showcased the campers, not their own egos. They worked 15 hours a day — and loved every minute of it.

# B/C's all-star counselors

B/C's Summer of '78 counselor staff consisted of 19 of the premier collegiate basketball players in America.

The reigning national champion, Kentucky, sent star playmaking guard Kyle Macy. National runnerup Duke contributed its All-American center, Mike Gminski. The 1977 championship finals also was represented — forward Bernard Toone from titlist Marquette and forward Al Wood from No. 2 North Carolina.

There were the scoring leaders — like Andrew Toney of Southwestern Louisiana, who poured through 24.5 points per game as a sophomore. There were the rebounding forces — like Jonathan Moore of Furman and muscleman Sam Clancy of Pittsburgh, who ranked 13th and 14th nationally with more than a dozen retrieves a game.

They came T-A-L-L. Average height of our 19 counselors was exactly 6-foot-7. Seven-footer Kevin McHale of Minnesota loomed largest, followed by the 6-11 Gminski and 6-10 Al Beal of Oklahoma, a two-time B/C counselor. Kentucky's Macy was one of only five counselors under 6-6.

Most of the major basketball conferences in America were represented, including the Atlantic Coast Conference, the Southeastern Conference, the Big Ten, the Big Eight and the Metro-7.

B/C's counselors were hand-picked in a similar manner as the campers and coaches. On-court dominance was important, of course, but hardly the final criteria. B/C invited only those players who exhibited the foremost in leadership qualities both on and off the floor.

We could hardly have selected a more qualified group. All contributed immensely to our success with their demonstrations at the daily station drills, with their athletic talent and with their interest in — and availability to — our campers.

In fact, many of our players wrote post-camp letters highly complimentary of the counselors' extra-effort individual instruction. It was a bonus beneficial to all.

Thirteen of these collegians are eligible to rejoin us in the Summer of '79. We sincerely hope they all can make it!
